Conference Format: For each of the Friday afternoon, Saturday morning, and Saturday afternoon sessions, we begin with an introduction to one of the Jesuit themes. This introduction is followed by two discussants: one to elucidate the theme in terms of education, the other to elucidate it in terms of e-commerce. Following the discussants, we break into small groups to brainstorm actionable ideas for bringing that Jesuit or business theme into our courses, research, or service. We end each of these sessions learning a Jesuit personal practice and how to lead others in it.Sunday we hear four presentations on innovative programs our colleagues have developed in areas of leadership and ethics. The goal is actionable ideas for better pursuing our mission in our business schools.

Buildings:

Redington Hall is the dorm almost everyone will be staying in. It is at the top of the hill.

Gunster Hall, the student center, has in it Eagen Auditorium and the Trophy Room (first floor) and the 3rd Floor Dining Hall, also called the Pocono Northeast Room. All plenary meetings will be held in Eagen Auditorium. Meals will either be in the Trophy Room or in the 3rd Floor Dining Hall.

St. Thomas Hall is across the main campus walkway from Gunster Hall. Small group meetings will be held in classrooms in St. Thomas Hall. Sunday's Mass and ecumenical service will be held in the chapel of St. Thomas Hall, which can be entered from outside the building on the side which is at the bottom of the hill.

Weinberg Memorial Library is next door to Gunster Hall (down hill). Friday evening's reception will be on the 5th floor of the library.

The Estate is further downhill from Gunster Hall and then across the street to the left (inside the stone-walled area). Saturday evening's reception will be held at the Estate. Board meetings and the Pre-Conference Workshop will also be held at the Estate.
